Shakespeare: Othello

The name Othello conjures up dark thoughts: Iago, Othello's ensign, warns Brabanzio, a Venetian senator, that "an old black ram is tupping your white ewe," alluding to the marriage between Othello and Desdemona, the senator's daughter. This innuendo sets the stage for miscegenation, misogyny, betrayal and distrust as the means by which Iago's devious plot controls all the other characters in order to destroy their lives.

Iago is far more powerful than Othello. So why is the play titled *Othello* and not *Iago*, when the latter holds the fate of all the other characters in his hand? Where do you suppose Shakespeare stands on the issues of a woman's right to choose a husband?

Come to class, having familiarized yourself with this story and be prepared for a discussion about the nature of true evil. A good film version is the Laurence Fishburn / Kenneth Branaugh edition.

Having received her PhD in Comparative Literature from UCSD in San Diego, Suzanne taught world literature on all levels at both UCSD and UTSA in San Antonio. 

In January 2023, President Biden signed a law to memorialize an original founder beloved by radicals and Ronald Reagan. Biden acknowledged "America is taking a step closer toward marking the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution by erecting a new monument to Thomas Paine in the nation's capital." While that long-overdue monument is being complet-

ed, this "forgotten founding freethinker" invites our serious consideration and appreciation.

With today's rise of religious nationalism, this revolutionary thinker presents a powerful reminder of the secular foundation of America that protects true religious freedom. Through his commitment to critical thinking, science and human rights, Paine offers a timeless practical path to a just society that extends across borders, including boundaries of belief. The class gives particular attention his revolutionary text The Age of Reason.

Chris Highland holds degrees from Seattle Pacific University and San Francisco Theological Seminary and has over 30 years experience in interfaith work. He has taught and given presentations in diverse venues for decades. A former ordained minister, he is now a humanist celebrant and freethinker. Elevated Living*

The invention of the passenger elevator not only transformed the urban skyline by playing a critical role in the development of the modern skyscraper, it also transformed the way in which people engage with the broader architectural landscape. It also very quickly assumed and has sustained a unique place in popular culture. This course will trace the technological, architectural, and cultural

history of the passenger elevator from the late 1860s to the present.

Lee Gray is the Senior Associate Provost and Professor of Architectural History at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. He received a Ph.D. in architectural history from Cornell University, a Masters in architectural history from the University of Virginia, and undergraduate degrees in architecture from Iowa State University. He is the author of From Ascending Rooms to Express Elevators: A history of the Passenger Elevator in the 19th Century (2002). Since July 2003 he has written monthly articles on the history of elevators, escalators and moving sidewalks for *Elevator World*, the leading international trade journal for the vertical transportation industry. He has published over 250 articles on the history of elevators, escalators and moving sidewalks and is currently working on a history of escalators.

Many fear that diagnosis and may deny the symptoms, concerned that others will think lesser of us. And before we are excluded by others, we exclude ourselves from community activities.

What if there were no stigma with dementia? What if we felt fully welcomed throughout our social circles, regardless of an increasing incidence of memory lapse or cognition? How would we want to be treated? Could getting tested sooner than later make a difference?

Join us for an engaging session with Kitty Hancock and Denise Baker, steering committee members of Dementia Friendly WNC.

Kitty Hancock, MSN RN, focuses on mental health and aging as a nurse educator. She is passionate about meaningful communication with people living with dementia. **Denise Baker** worked for the intelligence community in DC and traveled adventurously. She enjoys talking about what it's like to live with dementia having been diagnosed with MCI, Vascular Dementia and ultimately Alzheimer's in 2016.

What Does a Death Doula Do?

What does a Doula do? You may have heard of a doula supporting childbirth, but instead of assisting an expectant mother, a death doula aids in making decisions that will bring peace and comfort, not only to the dying but also their family. Decisions include choices of physicality, hospice, visitors, letters, and music.

How can you become an informed funeral consumer? What matters to you and your family? What should you ask when comparing funeral homes? How do you compare prices? What about prepaying?

Beyond burial choices, what are the options? We'll discuss donation to science, green burial, human composting and more.

Jennifer Duran has been a licensed funeral director and embalmer for 30 years. For the past decade she has also been a Certified Celebrant giving families the option of a more personalized funeral service with a focus on the deceased and honoring their spiritual beliefs. Jennifer began advocating to help families have the difficult, but necessary, conversations surrounding end-of-life decisions and what will happen after a death occurs. Jennifer and her family have been residents of Flat Rock 18 years.

Animal Rescue/Dog Assistance

We will learn about fostering and its challenges, rescuing pregnant dogs, and will hear a story about the impact fostering can have on animals, families and the community who open their hearts to them.

Next, we will learn about canine assistance worldwide, starting with conventional uses such as service dogs, police dogs, therapy dogs and search & rescue canines. We will then explore emerging uses of canines such as seizure response, court dogs, K-12 reading dogs, cancer detection, mobility partners, and dogs used for autism and psychiatric support. We will cover:

- *The history and evolution of canine-assistance dogs
- *Emerging roles in education, safety, medicine, literacy and mobility assistance
- *Cultural issues and expansion of roles for dogs in other cultures
- *Emerging research.

Jaime Seymour-Newton is an award-winning Master Photographer with 20 years of experience as a photographer and animal advocate. Passionate about photographing pets and their people, she has fostered hundreds of rescue dogs. Jaime recently relocated to Hendersonville from Miami with her husband and 3 dogs and has a studio in Flat Rock.

A Certified Therapy Dog Handler through the Alliance for Therapy Dogs organization, Tom Keating has worked with therapy dogs in a variety of venues including library reading programs, long-term care, acute care and collegiate environments. Tom has researched the use of assistive canines in supporting community engagement and meditation interventions.
